



Without TCHP services, many of these individuals would be forced to ignore their medical issues and/or utilized the emergency department for their care. St. Charles Township Road District News

Steve Frohling, Highway Commissioner

I would like for you to know that the Road District receives 1 percent of the 1.6 percent that the taxpayers pay to the Township for their taxes. With this 1 percent, we provide such services as: resurfacing, road repair, edge of road repair, culvert and drainage work, plowing and salting of the roads, brush trimming and mowing, brush pickup program, signage on the road, truck and equipment repairs and maintenance, and various other jobs on 90 miles of road.

We also provide emergency services when needed, and we are on call 24 hours a day and can be reached through the Sheriff's Office if needed after our regular office hours.

Please be sure to call the Road District phone number not the Supervisor's Office if you have flooding problems, signs down, trees down, or any other emergency situation that needs immediate assistance. If the situation arises and you are in need of sand and the bags because of flooding, please call our office and we will get them out right away to you. Remember, we can't help if we don't know you need it, so remember to call the Township Road District 630-584-3496 besides calling Kane County Office of Emergency Management in the future when help is needed in emergency situations. Soliticing Guidelines

Anyone soliciting in unincorporated St. Charles Township must register with the Kane County Sheriff's Office at 37W755 Route 38, St. Charles, IL.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION BEFORE Digging, Building, Planting in Road Right-of-Way

The road right-of-way is the area usually 33' feet from the center of the road (some roads vary). That area (33' feet from the center of the road) belongs to the Road District. You must get permission from the Highway Commissioner to do anything in that easement area. Boulders, underground fencing and sprinkler systems must be kept out of the road right-of-way. Stay in your property line when installing these things.

Also, MONUMENT MAILBOXES on road right-of-ways are illegal and not safe to the motoring public. Mailboxes must not be bigger than a 4x4 post per Post Office Regulations. When these regulations are not followed properly and things are built or planted in the road right-of-way, it cost the taxpayer because the township is forced to pay legal fees to have these situation remedied. Contact the Road District before putting anything in the easement (right-of-way) in front of your house.

REMEMBER TO CALL J.U.L.I.E. BEFORE YOU DIG UNLESS YOU HAVE A CONTRACTOR DOING THE WORK AND THEN THEY ARE TO CALL IT IN! THE NUMBER TO CALL IS 1-800-892-0123 AND BE SURE TO HAVE THE FOLLOWING INFO READY WHEN YOU CALL:

- Your name, address, and telephone number
- County and city or unincorporated township
- Location of the dig site
- Extent of the work involved (reason for dig)
- Date work will begin
- Permit number (if applicable)
- Section and quarter section numbers (if available)

Please do not dig without marks unless utility has indicated there are no facilities in the dig area. For more info about J.U.L.I.E. visit them online at www.illinois1call.com.

Brush Pickup for Unincorporated Township: Not City of St. Charles

We will concluded our brush pickup for the Unincorporated Township Roads the week of October 24th and will start up again next spring, probably the fourth Monday of April. We will be posting the schedule of brush pickups for the 2017 season on the website and in the spring newsletter.

Managing Your Leaves

- Mulching Leave shredded material on lawn and around trees and shrubs.
- Place shredded material in gardens or in adjacent wooded areas.
- Do not put leaves or grass for mulching in roadway or ditches. They will plug up storm drains especially in subdivisions that have curbs and will cause flooding.
- Composting Produce a valuable soil amendment for garden areas.

Bagged Collection of Leaves & Other Landscape Wastes - Please Note that local garbage companies provide this service to Township residents for a fee

Suggestions:

- No single approach will easily handle all your leaves. Try mulching as many as you possibly can, composting some, and then maybe bag the rest for your garbage pickup.
- Always shred or chop your leaves. Chopped leaves work best for mulch, compost faster, and fill fewer yard waste bags.

"Brush Only" Burning Regulations

Kane County has a burn ordinance that prohibits the burning of "landscape waste," which means all accumulations of grass cuttings, shrubbery cuttings, leaves, flowers and weeds. Residents may, however, still burn "brush" as long as they follow the Standard Restrictions.

Standard Restrictions:

- Only on the property where the landscape brush was generated;
- Only on sunny days from 10am to 3pm;
- Not when wind exceeds 10 mph;
- Not within 20 feet of any building, structure or property line;
- Not during announced inversion conditions or ozone alerts

 Any burning must be supervised until the fire is

Any burning must be supervised until the fire is extinguished; a fire extinguisher, garden hose or water source must be available at the burning site.

Exemptions:

- Any property zoned or used for agricultural purposes.
- Burning for prairie restoration or firefighter training.
- Burning of brush for recreational fires, but the fire cannot be larger than 3 ft. x 3 ft. x 3 ft.
- Ceremonial fires for a scheduled public or private event. Notice must be given to the local Fire Department, and a permit obtained from the Kane County Health Dept. at 630-208-3801.

Penalties:

• Any person who violates any provision shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$100 for a first offense and a fine of \$500 for subsequent offenses.

Safety Tidbits - Changes on Township Roads

- Street Signs you may have noticed on most of the main roads that the signs are larger now due to the changes in street sign regulations. We also have had a large number of street signs disappearing in our township. It is against the law to take any signage posted by the road district and those caught stealing these signs will be prosecuted. These signs are not to be used for decoration in your children's room and if you should see these signs anywhere but posted on the road where they belong please call your local road district or the sheriff's department.
- People driving on Burr Road or Crane Road should be aware of the hidden driveways on the top and bottom of hills and around curves. Be aware of the deer that run out in front of the cars and the bicyclists who sometime use the road right-of-way. These roads are very hilly and potentially dangerous to people who travel over the speed limit of 35mph on Crane Road and 40mph on Burr Road.
- School Speed Limits and Work Zone Speed Limits should be strictly adhered to – let the kids and road crew come home safe.
- Watch for new speed limit signs in subdivision entrances like on Old Homestead Rd., Mallard Lake Rd. and Heritage Oaks Rd. that state the speed limit 25mph and then reads "on all streets unless otherwise posted."
- Violations if you have a problem with speeding or parking on your street, please let the first call be to the sheriff's department at 630-232-6840.
- Reminder: Watch your speed limit on all Township Roads, the speed limit must be adhered to and will be enforced! There have been a number of complaints and the Sheriff's Office is aware of this. WATCH YOUR SPEED for your safety as well as your neighbors!

Homeowner's Association Information

The Township is seeking homeowner's association information for subdivisions that are in our unincorporated area. We want to keep you informed of any road improvements that may be happening in your subdivision, such as blacktopping or road closures.

Please call the Road District at 630-584-3496 to leave any info. If you call after hours, please leave a message and we'll call back if needed. Thanks in advance for all your help and to those who have already called to keep us up to date.



The winter weather will soon be here, and the Township is asking everyone to buckle up and drive safely throughout the season.

We will make every effort to keep your streets clear and safe for you. We will also have it done for you in a timely manner. But, we can only do that with your cooperation, by not parking your vehicle along the roadways until after they have been plowed and widened. We have been having a problem with parents parking by school bus pickups. Remember, we can't plow if cars are parked on the road. Please be considerate of our plows and move if our trucks are in the vicinity trying to plow the roads. We are doing this for you and the safety of your children.

Remember, if your mailbox is accidentally pushed over during a snowfall by one of the township snowplows only, please call the township and we will correct the situation as soon as possible. In the meantime try to place the mailbox temporarily upright so your mail will get delivered. However, we do not fix mailboxes if they are knocked over by someone backing into them, another vehicle hitting them or possibly a hired snowplow company clearing a drive and pushing the snow into your mailbox. Remember, no one knocks these mailboxes over on purpose, they are just trying to move the snow and most of the time it's the weight of the snow pushed up against an old post that causes the post to break. If the township has to replace a mailbox it will be replaced with a legal mailbox and post as required by the Postal Service not the fancy mailboxes that may have been there before.

Also, please be aware of the following:

605 ILCS 5/9-130. Deposit of snow or ice upon public highway—Prohibition

Section 9-130. No person, firm, corporation or institution, public or private, shall plow or remove or cause to be plowed or removed ice or snow from any shopping center, parking lot, commercial or institutional service area or driveway or any other public or private service area or driveway and deposit such ice or snow upon a public highway or along the shoulder or edge of a public highway.

Any person, firm, corporation or institution, public or private, which violates this Section, is guilty of a petty offense.

ALSO, PLEASE REMEMBER: NO PARKING ON ANY TOWNSHIP ROADS UNTIL AFTER ALL SNOW HAS BEEN CLEARED.

Fall Fire Safety Cooking Tips

Cooking is often a relaxing and fun task that brings the family together on crisp fall days. It provides a great way to showcase your creativity and love of great food with friends and family. But cooking is also the number one cause of home fires and home injuries. Being mindful while you cook can go a long way to helping prevent these fires and injuries.

Here's is what you need to know!

- Keep an eye on what you fry
- Keep alert while cooking with oils
- Keep things that catch fire away from your cooking area
- Keep a proper fire extinguisher nearby

Give yourself every advantage while cooking to avoid a possibly devastating fire in your home. Based on recent fire statistics, the *fall season is our greatest risk for cooking fires in the home.* Unattended cooking was the leading factor in home cooking fires. Here are some important facts:

- Two-thirds (66%) of home cooking fires started with the ignition of food or other cooking materials.
- Clothing was the item first ignited in less than 1% of these fires, but these incidents accounted for 18% of the cooking fire deaths.
- Ranges or cooktops accounted for the majority (61%) of home cooking fire incidents, while ovens accounted for 13%. More than half of reported non-fatal home cooking fire injuries occurred when the victims tried to fight the fire themselves. Precious time is lost when homeowners fail to call 911 for help right away.
- Frying poses the greatest risk of fire. Thanksgiving is the peak day for home cooking fires. If you plan to deep fry your turkey this season, please follow all safety tips provided by the appliance maker.

If you are on a limited or fixed income, in need of minor household repairs and can't afford to hire a commercial service contractor, help is near.

Health, safety and quality of life repairs are provided to homeowners in the Tri-City school boundary areas.

Labor is FREE and work is provided by a group of trustworthy volunteers experienced in plumbing, electrical, carpentry and other types of repairs. All volunteers are insured. Charges for materials will vary according to need and project. Depending on circumstances, materials may be free to low-income homeowners.

A volunteer will set up a meeting to assess your needs. Work is then scheduled based on those needs, repairs are evaluated and materials are assembled.
